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Color Harmonies are combinations of colors that create pleasing effects. We can create harmonious colors by choosing, mixing, and organizing our colors. Colors are divided into Warm and Cool categories.

- **1- Warm Colors** are associated with the sun, fire, and light. They give us the feeling of warmth, and closeness. These colors are yellow, orange, and red. Warm colors have an energizing effect.
- **2- Cool Colors** are associated with coolness of water, forests, and the chill in the air. These colors are blue, green, and purple. Cool colors have a cooling, calming, and refreshing effect. There are several methods of arranging colors. We can use the color wheel to generate a variety of color schemes.

Analogous Harmony: Colors that are situated next to each other on the color wheel are pleasing and harmonious. Examples include red, red- orange, yellow, yellow-green, and green. These colors are often found in nature. Any two colors next to each other on the color wheel and the variations in between them are harmonious.

Opposite Color Harmony or Complementary color Harmony:

Colors situated directly across form each other on the color wheel are also harmonious and create excitement. These colors can also be found in nature.like a red rose with a green stem. Red and green, purple and yellow, orange and blue are complementary colors.

Triadic Harmony: The three sets of colors that are equally spaced on the color wheel can be used together effectively. For example, red, yellow, and blue, or purple, green, and orange combinations are considered to be a triadic color scheme.

Monochromatic Harmony: Using one color with several different values and intensities like light browns and dark browns are considered monochromatic.

What about an Oops moment?



It only happens once in a blue moon that we hit a purple patch and everything works out perfectly at our first try. The Oops moment is when a project is near completion and a bolt from the blue appears. We may tip the ink jar or smudge the carefully addressed envelope, or splatter paint in a conspicuous area. We may be tempted to start over again, or we could see it as a silver lining in the cloud and try to salvage the work. Often adding a harmonious color in the same style or value, or a flourish can be the rescue plan. I suggest not to raise the white flag too soon. The grass is not always greener on a new sheet of paper! Personally I am not a shrinking violet, and I try to fix things with a bold statement. I think a few thoughtful strokes of just the right color can make the art work pop right off the page and greet us with a smile. It is my promise that being brave is more rewarding than timidly tickling and pecking at the art work, and this my friends is no red herring!

Taste of color and associations:

Imagine if we could taste color. The palette of colors are unlimited. What would that special shade of red, purple, or blue taste like? When we sharpen our vision for subtlety, stretch our range of harmonies, we can actually taste a new hue and intensity I think we all have experienced it but have not used the term of "tasting colors" When we see certain colors, we associate them with memories, tastes, and smells stored in our brain. Think of the ocean, do you taste the salty air? Think of a parade and a picnic in the park, what colors do you see and taste? Colors take us to the vast ocean of our imagination, and it is there that we can see, feel, and taste unique colors and find that perfect brush stroke that spells freedom.

Color Psychology:

Colors significantly impact how we express emotions in art and how we connect with our viewers. We can influence how others perceive and react to our creations. Colors are used strategically in marketing. There are many books available on the psychology of color and the impact of colors on human behavior. Some of us artist calligraphers are asked to create works for exhibition, commission, and marketing events. How can we use colors to enhance the personality and the mood we are trying to create?

Let's say we want to create a logo for a company that wants a rugged image or an invitation to impart a sophisticated feel, or a playful midsummer dinner party, or a soirée to impart an image of elegance and competence. We ask ourselves what font / hand ,and what colors should I choose?

What color? July exhibit offers a perfect setting to experiment. Shall we go out and paint the town red \bigcirc ? Oh so much to do, so little time. We still have cards to make a room to paint, a commission to complete, and we are full of ideas and are energized!

First, we need to decide what feeling we want to impart. To create a rugged feel, green and brown with low values and high intensity are great. To create a sense of competence, blue and black with high intensity work well. Painting a room is a complex decision, because we have to consider the vintage of the space and our personality and use. Are we going to sleep, eat, or create in that space? Colors for energy, enthusiasm, and creativity are oranges and yellows. Yellow is also used for imagination and optimism. Red boosts heart rate and increases brain activity. Cool colors are suitable for areas that we rest and want tranquility. We just have to remember to maintain balance, remember our objective, and keep it fun.







Two cards from Eleanor Lippman

An indoor Flower garden

May, 2021

- 1. Dot to Dot Make dots of your favorite flower colors close together on your absorbent paper. (ironed coffee filters work well.) Be sure to use some black, dark blue and brown to give zest to your work. Add contracting circles or petals around the dots.
- 2.. Watch you r flowers grow: Now dip a cotton swab into water and hold it still in the middle of a dot and wait. Watch the warmer spread to form the petals as it works out to the edge fo the dot. Be patient, let your flower grow on its own. Rubbing your flower may tear the paper
- 3. Flower flourish Try forming the flower petals with your weak bleach solution (15 pts water to 1 part bleach). As you hold the cotton swab in the center of your dot, your flower will grow before you with striking white throat. Be sure tier flowers your flowers into a crowded mass of blooms—this will keep them from appearing to floor in space. Let your flowers dry. Add the finishing touches with suggestions of stamens and pistils using a metallic pen before you decide on how to mount your piece. Use your viewfinders to find the best parts.
- **4. Stop and enjoy the flowers:** A glue stick works well for mounting this lightweight absorbent paper.
