Cynthia Griffin demonstrated how to make a mini-valentine. She had pre-cut paper and all the supplies needed to make this cute little card.









Cynthia Griffin demonstrated a clever way to make a glued book out of envelopes. She provided colorful envelopes for everyone.








March Meeting

The poetic styles for March were acrostic and elegy. Acrostic is a writing style that uses the first letters of each line to spell out a word. Each line refers or describes the word.

An elegy is a sad poem, usually written to praise and/or express sorrow for someone who is dead. It often laments or mourns the passing of a person or concept.

Patt Herdklotz's acrostic was "elegy."




The Calligraphers' Guild Exhibit at the Medford Public Library.

The Calligraphers' Guild was founded in 1975 and is celebrating their 50th Anniversary.

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Foundational Class

The Guild sponsored a Foundational Lettering Class at ScrappyCraft in Phoenix during February, March and April taught by JoAnn Evans.

All skill levels were represented and students chose to extend the class from four to eight weeks. The class also was attended by an online guild member in Merced.

Handouts were numerous and included inspiration pieces as well as the lettering exemplars. Variations on using the basic foundational hand were explored and used to create studio signs and finished pieces.

Pointed pen was introduced with Gwen Weaver's "Wascally Womans" lettering style. A pressure / release technique was also

used with this style ..


Studio tips were shared and the many aspects of paper were discussed. Types of paper, storage, usage, correcting mistakes, sample kits, conditioning new nibs, ink types, spacing, layout shortcuts and many other topics were covered in the short 8week class.











In Memoríam **Vírgínía Cook**


The Guild lost another long-time member, Virginia Cook. She was born July 2, 1940 and passed on January 25, 2025.


In her early years she danced on American Bandstand. One of her treasures was a brochure from the show with Dick Clark's photo on the front and his autograph inside.

She worked for SOS Care Packing for most of her adult life. Later, she volunteered for CASA and the helpline there.

She was married to Lawrence Gerald Cook for 60 years until his passing in 2016. They had two children, a son Robert and a daughter Melanie.

She took an active part in the Guild activities and attended many classes and workshops. She especially loved Fraktur blackletter, but was skilled in many other lettering styles. She created beautiful cards, books and wall pieces.






















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Eleanor Lippman – Foundational class homework
